

What are trade agreements?

1. Restrictions on how governments can interfere with imports

That's it.



The Core Questions

How will this agreement:

- 1. Practically change the playing field for UK businesses? (And for foreign businesses selling into the UK)
- 2. Impact UK consumers?
- 3. Restrict the power of UK legislators?
- 4. Restrict the authority of UK regulators and implementing agencies?



Trade Policy Golden Rules

- 1. What's in a trade agreement is the bare minimum.
- 2. Just because it is written, does not mean it is so.



Services Trade Barriers: Principles

- 1. What is the rule?
- Can you theoretically meet the rule?
- 3. What's required to prove you meet it?
 - i. Are there additional hoops to jump through?

Common Services Barriers



Market Access

Is this service still legal and acceptable if delivered by:



Delivered Remotely (Mode 1)



Customer Travels (Mode 2)



Commercial Presence (Mode 3)



Temporary Presence (Mode 4)



Examples:

- 1. How much Cabotage can be performed by foreign firms (Mode 1)?
- 2. If you get a pilot's licence abroad, will it be valid (Mode 2)?
- 3. Can a foreign owned firm operate a major utility (Mode 3)?
- 4. Can your builder fly in a foreign crew (Mode 4)?



Recognition

Are your qualifications still accepted?



Professional Qualifications



Licenses



Certificates



Examples:

- 1. Not just professional qualifications
 - i. Machinery licences and component certifications
 - ii. Accreditations
 - iii. Safety / Policy Checks (e.g. Working with Children)




Questions to think about:

- 1. Will it be accepted (obviously)?
- 2. What happens when existing certifications **expire**?
- 3. If I need to **recertify**, how should I do it?
- 4. What are the **insurance** and **liability** implications?



Establishment:

Can I own a business that offers services?





Questions to think about:

- 1. Is my corporate **structure adequate** to continue offering services to EU citizens?
- 2. Can I **adjust** my corporate structure?
 - i. What would I need to do?
 - ii. Could these requirements **change** in the future?
- 3. Will local competitors enjoy an advantage?



Scrutiny:

Will my business have to provide more information?








Visas:

Can my staff travel overseas for work?





Questions to think about:


- Eligibility of your EU staff in the UK to keep working?
- 2. Can you continue sending staff to the EU to perform work?
- **3. How many** EU Member States your staff travel to?




Data:

How will GDPR impact my business?









If UK gets an adequacy ruling:

- 1. You can continue handling EU citizen data as you do now;
 - i. Provided you are currently GDPR compliant of course



If UK doesn't:

- 1. If you handle the data of, or store information on, EU citizens you may need to:
 - i. Establish a representative in one or more EU countries as a GDPR focal point;
 - ii. Re-write your contracts to include **Standard Contracting Clauses** effectively replicating the GDPR regime.






Trade Agreements - Services

National Treatment

Do I treat your firm the same way I do your local competitors?



Recognition

Do I accept your qualification as sufficient to practice in my country?

Key things to watch in UK-EU FTA

- 1. Definition of 'short-term visitor'
 - UK wants far more liberal definition than EU
- 2. Local Presence Requirements
- 3. Market access in key sectors:
 - i. Legal
 - ii. Professional Services
 - iii. Transportation & Logistics
- 4. Side Agreements
 - i. GDPR
 - ii. Regulatory Equivalence and Cooperation
 - iii. Recognition or Frameworks Therefore
